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Reception Newsletter - Friday 31st March 2017

Language

Last week we shared a collection of 'under the sea' poems from 'Commotion in the Ocean.' We talked about rhyming words and used these poems to help us think of additional rhyming words. We also wrote some of our own poetry in the form of shape poems and acrostic poems. This week we have been looking at the non-fiction texts we borrowed from the library. We have been exploring their features and writing facts about sea creatures using all of our writing tricks. We have really enjoyed finding out fascinating things; did you know that the blood of an octopus appears to look blue?!

Maths

In our maths work last week we revisited shape and pattern. We focussed on the 3d shapes (cube, cuboid, pyramid, cone, sphere, cylinder) and used the language of 'faces', 'corners' and 'edges' to help us describe their properties. We also compared these shapes to real life objects whilst conducting shape hunts around the classroom. This week we are assessing the children on their ability to apply their number knowledge to solve mathematical problems. We have been very impressed with the children's improved knowledge of numbers to 20 and their ability to count on and back. We are now focussing on finding the number that is one less as well as doubling numbers to 10 and finding half. Please continue to practise these skills at home.

Spellings

We are in the process of assessing the children on our current spellings for this half term. We will also be re-assessing children on any words they were unable to spell in our previous assessment. We will update you with their spelling scores before Easter.

We hope that you enjoyed our special assembly. We were so proud of the children for being so brave and speaking and singing so confidently. Thank you for all of your kind words and thanks. We have passed your messages on to the children.

In preparation for this day our homework task this week is designed to encourage children to start thinking about what they already know about Great Britain.
