## Subject Specific Vocabulary

<b>suburb</b>	A suburb is an area of a town or city, a little away from the main part, where there are fewer big buildings and mainly houses, schools and shops.
<b>aerial view</b>	An aerial view means to look at something from above.
<b>key</b>	A list of symbols that appear on the map
<b>congestion</b>	When vehicles travel slower because there is too much traffic on roads. This makes trip times longer and increases queueing. This is also known as a traffic jam.
<b>public transport</b>	A system for taking people from one place to another, for example, using buses or trains.
<b>pedestrians</b>	A pedestrian is a person travelling on foot, whether walking or running.
<b>pedestrian crossings</b>	A marked path where people can safely walk across a street or road.
<b>zebra crossing</b>	Zebra crossings are marked with black and white stripes on the road and zigzag lines on either side. These markings warn drivers that there may be pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross the road.
<b>pelican crossing</b>	A type of pedestrian crossing which features a set of traffic lights, plus a push button and a further two coloured lamps for pedestrians using the crossing.
<b>speed limit</b>	Speed limits on road traffic set the legal maximum speed at which vehicles may travel on a given stretch of road.
